From the Vicarage

Dear friends

Dignity.

Pope Francis once said - 'Human Dignity is the same for all human beings: when I trample on the dignity of another, I am trampling on my own.'

During this season of Epiphany much in our scripture readings reveals concepts about human worth - Jesus is affirmed as My beloved Son. We are affirmed as God's children. Water is changed into wine - a new era when the Holy Spirit is poured out on all people. At Candlemas, coming up this month, we also see the prophet Simeon affirming Jesus' worth as a baby and as the Son of God, a light to the nations.

The concept of human worth and dignity is explored in a recent article about assisted dying by the Theos Think Tank, a research institute that aims to engage public debate concerning faith and the world we find ourselves in. One of the premises in the recent debates about assisted dying has been that dignity is dependent on personal choice, the right to choose how and when human life is ended. The article presents an alternative model - one in which the premise is that dignity comes through relationship not autonomy.

When Esther Rantzen was interviewed about the Bill on the BBC, she said - "All I'm asking for is that we be given the dignity of choice. If I decide my own life is not worth living, please may I ask for help to die. It's a choice. I don't want to pressure anyone either way ... it's the most personal choice, like others, like whether or not to have a baby ... I'm asking for choice."

If dignity is understood to mean independence/autonomy, which is exercised as choice, there is no good reason not to extend the offer of assisted dying beyond the kind of people envisaged in Kim Leadbeater's Bill. They argue that this philosophy has no philosophical breaks.

Whereas dignity as based on loving relationships, in the inalienable worth of human beings as inherently relational, leads to the conclusion that people's needs are best alleviated by greater person-centred care and support, especially palliative care. 'If we want truly to honour people's dignity, we must build a society that cares for people as passionately and profoundly as possible, right to the end of the lives.'

The concept of dignity is crucial in today's rapidly changing world - how do we show a persons' worth - in life, on social media, with the growth of Artificial Intelligence, in a rapidly changing workplace, in warfare, in climate change, in death? Perhaps too many deep questions for reading this magazine over your morning coffee!!

Often when Christians consider and pray about Jesus on the cross, we use the phrase from the book of Lamentations 'ls it nothing to you, all you who pass by? Look around and see.' We cannot pass by the question/s the assisted dving debate raise/s about human worth and its implications.

ECO CHURCH Habitats

I wonder if you have ever considered the impact that the foods you eat and the ingredients you use in cooking may have on the lives of other beings?

Recently, I heard of an eight year old lass who had a passion for orangutans. On learning that huge swathes of the Malaysian and Indonesian tropical rainforests had been burnt down in order to provide land for palm oil plantations, which seriously impacted on the habitat of her beloved orangutans, she decided that she would no longer eat or use products which contained palm oil. Not easy; since palm oil is present in many biscuits, sweets and most processed foods. Between the years 1999 and 2015, the orangutan population more than halved, lost along with their forest homes. But you will be aware there are many more such examples of lost habitat. What can each of us do?

Some of you may remember Chris Packham's wildlife presentations. In one he commented on the silence as he walked through a new housing estate. There were no birds, bees or butterflies. It was a 'human-made desert', with no room for other creatures to thrive.

The Church of England's fifth mark of Mission is - 'To strive to safeguard the integrity of creation and sustain and renew the life of the earth'.

In Harnham, we are fortunate to have two churchyards. We hope they are places of prayer and tranquillity, where families can feel their loved ones are resting in peace and beauty. However, we also work to have 'Living Churchyards', where hedgehogs, froglets, dragonflies, also swifts, bats and housemartins, to name but a few, can live and breed safely.

At St George's. we have some old, totally virgin land, so there are many dormant wildflowers which, when given the opportunity, will surface and show off they vibrant beauty. To encourage these wildflowers requires a certain amount of management, allowing some areas to go wild, which also benefits invertebrates. Generally we would aim to cut all these areas fairly hard in late autumn but last year this did not prove possible. However, I am hopeful that this can be rectified and we may continue to see many wildflowers, offering nectar to our bees. Also, safe habitats to our many creatures. But you will also see areas where the grass is growing longer, it may look a bit untidy, but remember there will be creatures enjoying the safety of such areas.

I like to hope that our dead, like the voice in 'Dies Natalis', Natal Day or Day of Birth by Thomas Traherne, the 17th century poet, have similar experiences -

"From dust I rise and out of nothing now awake, These brighter regions which salute my eyes, A gift from God I take, the earth, the seas, the light, the lofty skies, The sun and stars are mine: if these I prize".

Wednesday 15th January saw the first of a series of film nights presented jointly by Harnham Community Network and Harnham Social Club.

The function room of the Social Club on Parsonage Green, fitted with a wide-screen projector, seating and tables, was the scene for the screening of "Twisters". This 2024 thriller is full of jeopardy and high-tension, nerve-wracking scenes. The plot sees two groups of storm chasers with different motives and personalities repeatedly clash as they try to investigate what is possibly the most dramatic weather phenomenon on Earth, the tornado. If there are weaknesses - some rather stereotyped characters and questionable technology - this is more than compensated for by the relentless delivery of life-or-death, will-they-or-won't-they make it scenes. By the interval we were wondering which way the plot would twist next and if the two groups would have to cooperate. After two hours one's adrenaline system has certainly been exercised, and it may take a while to relax afterwards. A thriller that leaves you feeling like you have experienced something dramatic yourself has done its job, and this film delivers.

The Harnham Social Club provided a relaxed environment, with complimentary tea and coffee and reasonably priced drinks from the bar available all evening.

Thanks to Roger Treleaven and the Community Network for initiating the idea and organising the film, Clare Dickinson and Joe Snook at the Social Club for providing the projection equipment, hosting the event and welcoming us. Also thanks to "All the Sevens" taxis for offering free transport to and from the event for Harnham residents with mobility difficulties.

Unsafe routes

Before Christmas Salisbury Journal had articles concerned about safe routes.

In Harnham the major walking route just off the Gyratory is within touching distance of huge HGV's displaying signs 'not to go alongside due to reduced visibility'. There is also a new problem of fast ebikes on pathways eg Town Path, Harnham - city.

I received no answer to a public meeting question concerning what were the proposals for Harnhams' roads and pathways. No information was provided despite formally requesting it in advance. It was however invited to look at the council's proposals on line and prepared a drawing which among other things suggested widening New Bridge and replacing the bridge path with a low cost new footbridge similar to as exists at Amesbury. A letter to MP John Glen which I was given site of dismissed the idea on the grounds that a lack of land and wider lanes would not improve traffic flow.

There is no doubt some proposals would improve matters but better and more radical ideas for safer path routes and especially what the detail was, is absent. A further response stated that the Council followed safety standards and were busy appointing a contractor. They have no mandate to consult local people.

During last year Harnham and the hospital suffered serious traffic chaos due to a lack of traffic management when Old Harnham Bridge was closed. Piecemeal strategies and delegating implementation without any plan simply does not work.

What account is being taken of the hospital development plan and a need for better access to improve its internal plan layout. You cannot ignore that the Britford school route and the exit in the dip from Lower Britford is made more dangerous by large HGVs. Could development money/government funds be provided to alter the line of Downton Road if only for safety reasons.

It is interesting to note that a 2020 Area Framework paper (CAF) completely ignored Harnham through which major infrastructure serving the city passes.

"Anytime," her daughter replied.


As the woman slammed the car door she said, "I wasn't talking to you. I was talking to God."

All in the month of February

It was:

125 years ago, on 27th Feb 1900 that the Labour Party was founded in the UK.

80 years ago, during Feb 1945 that Anne Frank died. The young Dutch Jewish diarist and Holocaust victim died in Bergen-Belsen concentration camp at the age of 15, probably from typhus.

Also 80 years ago, on 13th to 15th Feb 1945 that the bombing of Dresden took place. The Allies carried out four massive bombing raids, completely destroying the inner city, and killing about 25,000 people.

Also 80 years ago, on 21st Feb 1945 that Eric Liddell, Scottish athlete, died. An Olympic gold medallist in 1924 (400 m), he had withdrawn from the 100m heats, because they were on a Sunday, and entered the 400 m instead. Liddell died in a WWII internment camp in China, aged 43.

75 years ago, on 8th Feb 1950 that the world's first payment by credit card took place. The founders of Diners Club (now Diners Club International) used it to pay their restaurant bill at Majero's Cabin Grill in New York City.

70 years ago, from 24th Feb 1955 to March that Britain's Big Freeze took place. Deep snow and freezing temperatures caused havoc, with many places cut off.

65 years ago, on 8th Feb 1960 that the Hollywood Walk of Fame was established in Hollywood. It consists of more than 2,700 stars embedded in the pavement, bearing the names of notable figures from entertainment.

Also 65 years ago, on 8th Feb 1960 that Queen Elizabeth II issued an Order-in-Council stating that she and her family would be known as the House of Windsor, and that her descendants would use the name Mountbatten-Windsor.

50 years ago, on 11th Feb 1975 that Margaret Thatcher became the first female leader of the Conservative Party. She became Britain's first female Prime Minister in 1979.

40 years ago, on 16th Feb 1985 that the Islamic militant group and political party Hezbollah was founded in Lebanon.

30 years ago, on 2nd Feb 1995 that the leaders of Egypt, Jordan, Israel and the Palestine Liberation Organisation held an emergency summit in Cairo, where they reaffirmed their commitment to the Middle East peace process.

Also 30 years ago, on 16th Feb 1995 that the environmental campaign group Greenpeace discovered Shell's plan to dump its defunct *Brent Spar* oil rig in the Atlantic. It launched an international campaign to stop it, and the rig was eventually taken to Norway where it was dismantled and part of it were used to extend a quay.

Also 30 years, on 26th Feb 1995 that Barings Bank, the oldest merchant bank in London, collapsed after its chief trader in Singapore, Nick Lesson, lost £827 million on unauthorised transactions.

What's the Big Idea? An Introduction to the Books of the Old Testament:

Job

'Why does God allow suffering?' This is a frequently asked question of Christians, because we believe in a God who is both good and powerful and it is explored in the book of Job. This book is part of the wisdom literature, along with Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, and Song of Solomon.

Job was both wealthy and righteous, yet he experienced catastrophic suffering, losing all his wealth, children and health. This is portrayed as a result of Satan's challenge to God, testing whether Job's devotion to God was dependent on his circumstances or not.

The main body of the book (3:1-42:6) consists of dialogues between Job, his friends (Eliphaz, Bildad, and Zophar) and God. Job and his friends assume that God is almighty and just, and that no human being is wholly innocent. In the three cycles of speeches they wrestle with the reasons for Job's suffering, remembering his morally upright character.

Finally, all are silenced by God, as He speaks Himself (chapters 38-42). He points out that Job knows very little about the universe when he reflects on God's power. Job confesses his lack of understanding and weakness, but then goes on to confess his confidence and trust in God. This puts suffering in a right perspective. Job is not condemned, and the book ends with the restoration of his family and possessions.

The importance of this book is that it realistically addresses the painful questions of life, without offering simplistic answers. It focuses on how we should respond to suffering, rather than on why God allows suffering: 'Naked I came from my mother's womb, and naked I shall depart. The LORD gave and the LORD has taken away; may the name of the LORD be praised.' (1:21)
